Subject: Coating of Appurtenances in the Field versus Shop

Issue:

Which coatings rules are applicable to an appurtenance that has been removed from a stationary structure to be coated?

Analysis:

Rule 1113 (a) specifies that the rule is applicable to the coating of "stationary structures or their appurtenances". If an appurtenance, say a door, were removed from the structure in order to apply a coating, the applicable rule would depend on where that appurtenance was painted. If it was taken to a shop and coated in a spray booth, the applicable rule would be substrate dependent (e.g. <u>Rule 1136</u> for a wood door, <u>Rule 1107</u> for a metal door).

Rule 1113 would apply to the coating of architectural components coated at the structure site or at a temporary unimproved location designated exclusively for the coating of structural components. Additionally, the paint spray application equipment used in the field would be exempt from permit requirements pursuant to Rule 219(I)(9).

Conclusion:

The applicable rule is location and substrate dependent. Field coating of architectural structures or their appurtenances falls under Rule 1113, but a different rule could apply if the appurtenance is removed and taken to a shop.
